We appreciate the beautiful poem “In Flanders Fields”, written by Dr. John McRae in 1915:

**In Flanders Fields, the poppies grow

The poem’s references to the red poppies that grew over the graves of fallen soldiers resulted in the poppy becoming one of the world’s most recognized memorial symbols for soldiers who have died in conflict.

Editor’s Note: “**In Flanders Fields**” is a war poem written during the First World War, by Canadian physician Lieutenant-Colonel John McRae (1872–1918). He was inspired to write it on May 3, 1915, after presiding over the funeral of a friend and fellow soldier, who died in the Second Battle of Ypres, in the Flanders region of Belgium. “In Flanders Fields” has become one of the most quoted poems from the war.
